Pupil	Bronze	Pupils are increasingly identifying Global issues to which they would like to		
Participation		respond. Whilst these have been mainly focussed on fund raising or adopting		
in Active		animals, some year groups are beginning to identify that they could take practical		
Global		action. For example, Year 6 ran an Earth Abuse Campaign which led to children		
Citizenship		contacting and meeting the local MP. There has been a whole school project on		
		single use plastics which led to a recycling campaign. Year 5 have a regular		
		opportunity to debate global issues with social impacts through the Burnet News		
		Club and often identify where action could be taken.		
Community	Bronze	Pupils have shared their learning with parents and church members through		
Engagement		leading worship, contributing to a noticeboard in St Barnabas Church and the		
		Church newsletter. All fundraising events have been highlighted in newsletters		
		and the school's social media. The school has recently developed a Global		
		Citizens webpage on the school website that is beginning to be populated with		
		pupils' work. Year 6 pupils have also communicated with their local MP regarding		
		ecological issues.		

Next steps

- Make explicit plans to develop pupils' courageous advocacy further and their understanding that all people should be treated with respect.
- Provide opportunities for pupils to extend their responses to 'big issues' beyond fundraising to have more frequent opportunities to consider issues of injustice and inequality in the majority world.
- Enhance existing links with the wider community to support pupils as they respond to 'big issues'.

I received comprehensive documentation that showed some very engaging activities around school, indicating that children are engaging well with the global citizenship curriculum, especially when ecological issues are the foci.
